2019—The Year in Review

Thanks to your support, things got even lighter and brighter around RVCC this year, while we further reduced our carbon footprint through our "Green Initiative, Too" projects. Some highlights:

- Completion of the planning, fundraising and wholesale renovation of the RVCC Kitchen, paving the way for a brand-new tenant, thanks to the incredible volunteer crew of the Building & Grounds Committee;
- A re-configured and re-graveled **parking lot and service road, and a new paved walk path** in the Wildflower Meadow, all parts of our "Accessibility Improvement" project finished this summer;
- Brand-new **lighting for the parking lot, hoops court and skate ramp**, improving safety and extending rec hours at the Rock, as the final task of our "Green Initiative, Too" projects;
- Another whirlwind year packed with events, meetings and classes, including House Concerts, pancake breakfasts, orchestra practices, rehearsals and performances, art exhibits, Winter Markets, dance, exercise and educational classes and public meetings, all filling our public spaces with non-stop activities;
- Re-mulching of the walking trail, grooming of the wildflower meadow, trimming of foundation plantings and new paint for the East hallway, the Green Screen and the kitchen exterior, thanks to over 30 volunteers from **United Way "Day of Caring**";
- Wonderful fundraising events that helped us fill the coffers, including Rescue Runway, Celebrate Rockfish, SK8 Nelson and Rockfish Nights, despite monsoons & heat waves;
- The **best-ever year-to-date sales** for the Treasure Chest, under the leadership of new manager Catherine Dunne and her awesome staff and volunteers:
- New picnic tables and benches for the fields and creek-side walking path, thanks to the talents
 of the Nelson High School Building Trades class;
- Sad goodbyes to long-time tenants Old Orchard Farm, Digital ReLab and Claudia's Catering, and warm welcomes for new tenants The Artist Collective, Odeene LLC, Taj Mahal Kitchen and an expanded Trager Bros Coffee in the Concession Stand, Room 7, the Kitchen and Room 12;
- A fresh update to our Strategic Plan, promising new surveys of our membership and community and new strategies for expanding outreach and inclusion, beginning with the hiring of an Outreach Coordinator/Event Planner in 2020;
- The exploration of a new partnership with the Piedmont Family YMCA to explore and potentially implement kids programming beginning next summer; and
- The kickoff of our "Reduce the Refuse" fundraising campaign to fund our recycling effort and to help raise funds for central air conditioning in four more rooms in the main building.

Programs and Fundraising

A few of the many highlights of 2019!

Pancake Breakfasts



After a six-month hiatus while we renovated the RVCC kitchen, our monthly community breakfast returned in October. The Pancake Breakfasts draw anywhere from 60—120 hungry folks to our Dining Room on the first Saturday of each month. It's an all-you-can-eat buffet of pancakes, bacon, sausage, eggs, grits, OJ, and good company! The program is run entirely by volunteers, and provides a wonderful way to meet and get to know your neighbors, whether it's over a plate of food or the pancake griddle. Come cook and eat with us!

The Treasure Chest Thrift Store



The Treasure Chest thrift store has been a source of financial support for RVCC since its opening in 2001. The store performs an essential service for the community: this is a place where people can recycle and find all types of gently used items. In addition to serving shoppers, store staff and volunteers often serve a more quiet service. On a daily basis, people's needs are met whether or not they are able to pay. When items cannot be sold, most of what is culled from the inventory goes to another organization that serves the lowincome population of Nelson and elsewhere. Under the leadership of manager

Catherine Dunne, the Treasure Chest had its biggest year ever in 2019, with annual sales reaching \$98,968.

SK8 Nelson



In 2009, Nelson County's first and only skate park opened at RVCC. And in 2019, SK8 Nelson celebrated its 10th anniversary with the 5th Annual SK8 Nelson Fundraising Festival. The SK8 Nelson skate park has always been free and open to the public, but it costs RVCC upwards of \$4000/year in liability insurance premiums and maintenance expenses. The 2019 fundraising festival, featuring skate competitions, skate lessons, live music, and local food and brews, raised over \$3500 to help offset these expenses.

Rescue Runway



The 3rd Annual Rescue Runway fashion show, a joint fundraiser for RVCC and the Almost Home Pet Adoption Shelter, raised over \$3,000 for our two organizations. Rescue Runway features volunteer models showing off outfits from RVCC's Treasure Chest Thrift Store and the SPCA Thrift Store. along with gift baskets for raffle and a sumptuous spread of finger foods. Many of the models are joined on the runway by pets adopted from Almost Home, and the event draws hundreds of

people in support of both nonprofits.



Volunteer Spotlight

Due to term limitations, two of our most dedicated directors will be stepping down from the Board this spring. Gifford Childs and Bob Yoder have devoted countless hours of leadership, labor and love to this organization, and their presence on the Board of Directors will be greatly missed.

We cannot adequately express how grateful we are to Bob and Gifford for their experience and their commitment, and while they have assured us that they will both continue to volunteer in their areas of interest, we are counting the days until they will be eligible for re-election!

Gifford Childs is one of the founders of the Rockfish Valley Community Center. He has guided the progress and development of this organization since those first cold winter meetings in late 1999, and has led or contributed to every major construction and renovation project this building has undergone in the past 20 years.

Gifford has served as the President of the Board for several terms. Rumor has it that he will continue to chair both the Building & Grounds and the SK8 Nelson committees, all while working as a snowsport instructor at Wintergreen, serving on the Nelson County Board of Zoning Appeals, and spending time with his family.






Due to careful management of our expenses, we have more than tripled our end-of-year cash balance (our "rainy day fund") since 2017.






Looking Forward
